Today's Readings

First Reading (Isaiah 50:4-7)

The Lord God has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to speak to the weary a word that will rouse them. Morning after morning he opens my ear that I may hear; and I have not rebelled, have not turned back. I gave my back to those who beat me, my cheeks to those who plucked my beard; my face I did not shield from buffets and spitting. The Lord God is my help, therefore I am not disgraced; I have set my face like flint, knowing that I shall not be put to shame.

Psalm (Psalm 22:8-9,17-18,19-20,23-24)

R. My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

All who see me scoff at me; they mock me with parted lips, they wag their heads: "He relied on the Lord; let him deliver him, let him rescue him, if he loves him."

R. My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

Indeed, many dogs surround me, a pack of evildoers closes in upon me; they have pierced my hands and my feet; I can count all my bones.

R. My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

They divide my garments among them, and for my vesture they cast lots. But you, O Lord, be not far from me; O my help, hasten to aid me.

R. My God, my God, why have you abandoned me?

I will proclaim your name to my brethren; in the midst of the assembly I will praise you: "You who fear the Lord, praise him; all you descendants of Jacob, give glory to him; revere him, all you descendants of Israel!"

Second Reading (Philippians 2:6-11)

Christ Jesus, though he was in the form of God, did not regard equality with God something to be grasped. Rather, he emptied himself, taking the form of a slave, coming in human likeness; and found human in appearance, he humbled himself, becoming obedient to the point of death, even death on a cross. Because of this, God greatly exalted him and bestowed on him the name which is above every name, that at the name of Jesus every knee should bend of those in heaven and on earth and under the earth, and every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father.

Gospel (Luke 19:28-40)

Jesus proceeded on his journey up to Jerusalem. As he drew near to Bethphage and Bethany at the place called the Mount of Olives, he sent two of his disciples. He said, "Go into the village opposite you, and as you enter it you will find a colt tethered on which no one has ever sat. Untie it and bring it here. And if anyone should ask you, 'Why are you untying it?' you will answer, 'The Master has need of it.'" So those who had been sent went off and found everything just as he had told them. And as they were untying the colt, its owners said to them, "Why are you untying this colt?" They answered, "The Master has need of it." So they brought it to Jesus, threw their cloaks over the colt, and helped Jesus to mount. As he rode along, the people were spreading their cloaks on the road; and now as he was approaching the slope of the Mount of Olives, the whole multitude of his disciples began to praise God aloud with joy for all the mighty deeds they had seen. They proclaimed: "Blessed is the king who comes in the name of the Lord. Peace in heaven and glory in the highest." Some of the Pharisees in the crowd said to him, "Teacher, rebuke your disciples." He said in reply, "I tell you, if they keep silent, the stones will cry out!"

Gospel Reflection

We begin the 'Holy Week' during which we see Jesus reaches the climax of his passion, each unfolding event emphasizing the deepest meaning of his life and teachings. During this week he will speak of our human condition: our life with all its sorrow, pain, work, worry, anguish and anxiety or their absence. He invites us to walk with him so that we can imitate his "self-emptying" attitude, emptying ourselves of our own will and our desire to control our own lives and the lives of others. This is not a call to a life of pain and misery but to a life of deep freedom, peace and happiness. It is not easy even if we are sincere, but Isaiah assures us "The Sovereign LORD has given me a well-instructed tongue, to know the word that sustains the weary. He wakens me morning by morning, wakens my ear to listen like one being instructed" (Isaiah 50:4).

The narration we listen on Palm Sunday is the most central to salvation history - of how Jesus laid down his life for our redemption. We may quick to condemn many of the characters presented in the account. But think for a while: would we have acted differently if we were in a similar situation? Judas may be considered the most wicked in the story, but his love for money may not be totally in our life. Those who handed over Jesus to death were more concerned about their positions and privileges than justice and truth; we need to ask ourselves how often we have yielded to self-interest and opportunism than stood for justice and fairness. If the disciples fled the scene when the soldiers came for Jesus, we remember how carefully we have shunned risk involving situations. If we did not deny Jesus as Peter did, we are sure we have avoided taking an evangelical stand on many issues that mattered. Yes, we find ourselves doing the very things that we condemn in others. But we have hope yet. It was to make amends for these and similar failures of ours that Jesus came. We surrender our sinful selves to him.


