Today's Readings

First Reading (*Jeremiah 1:4-5, 17-19*)

The word of the Lord came to me, saying: Before I formed you in the womb I knew you, before you were born I dedicated you, a prophet to the nations I appointed you. But do you gird your loins; stand up and tell them all that I command you. Be not crushed on their account, as though I would leave you crushed before them; for it is I this day who have made you a fortified city, a pillar of iron, a wall of brass, against the whole land: against Judah's kings and princes, against its priests and people. They will fight against you but not prevail over you, for I am with you to deliver you, says the Lord.

Psalm (*Psalms 71:1-2, 3-4, 5-6, 15, 17*)

R. I will sing of your salvation.

In you, O Lord, I take refuge; let me never be put to shame. In your justice rescue me, and deliver me; incline your ear to me, and save me.

R. I will sing of your salvation.

Be my rock of refuge, a stronghold to give me safety, for you are my rock and my fortress. O my God, rescue me from the hand of the wicked.

R. I will sing of your salvation.

For you are my hope, O Lord; my trust, O God, from my youth. On you I depend from birth; from my mother's womb you are my strength.

R. I will sing of your salvation.

My mouth shall declare your justice, day by day your salvation. O God, you have taught me from my youth, and till the present I proclaim your wondrous deeds.

Second Reading (*1 Corinthians 12:31-13:13*)

Brothers and sisters: [Strive eagerly for the greatest spiritual gifts. But I shall show you a still more excellent way. If I speak in human and angelic tongues, but do not have love, I am a resounding gong or a clashing cymbal. And if I have the gift of prophecy, and comprehend all mysteries and all knowledge; if I have all faith so as to move mountains, but do not have love, I am nothing, if I give away everything I own, and if I have my body over so that I may boast, but do not have love, I gain nothing.]

Love is patient, love is kind. It is not jealous, it is not pompous, it is not inflated, it is not rude, it does not seek its own interests, it is not quick-tempered, it does not brood over injury, it does not rejoice over wrongdoing but rejoices with the truth. It bears all things, believes all things, hopes all things, endures all things. Love never fails. If there are prophecies, they will be brought to nothing; if tongues, they will cease; if knowledge, it will be brought to nothing. For we know partially and we prophesy partially, but when the perfect comes, the partial will pass away. When I was a child, I used to talk as a child; when I became a man, I put aside childish things. At present we see indistinctly, as in a mirror, but then face to face. At present I know partially; then I shall know fully, as I am fully known. So faith, hope, love remain, these three; but the greatest of these is love.

Gospel (*Luke 4:21-30*)

Jesus began speaking in the synagogues, saying: "Today this Scripture passage is fulfilled in your hearing." And all spoke highly of him and were amazed at the gracious words that came from his mouth. They also asked, "Isn't this the son of Joseph?" He said to them, "Surely you will quote me this proverb, 'Physician, cure yourself,' and say, 'Do here in your native place the things that we heard were done in Capernaum.'" And he said, "Amen, I say to you, no prophet is accepted in his own native place. Indeed, I tell you, there were many widows in Israel in the days of Elijah when the sky was closed for three and a half years and a severe famine spread over the entire land. It was to none of these that Elijah was sent, but only to a widow in Zarephath in the land of Sidon. Again, there were many lepers in Israel during the time of Elisha the prophet; yet not one of them was cleansed, but only Naaman the Syrian." When the people in the synagogue heard this, they were all filled with fury. They rose up, drove him out of the town, and led him to the brow of the hill on which their town had been built, to hurl him down headlong. But Jesus passed through the midst of them and went away.

Gospel Reflection

Today's Gospel passage resumes the last verse of last Sunday's reading and recounts what happened in the synagogue of Nazareth when Jesus proclaimed the beginning of the year of grace.

It is not clear why the people of Nazareth suddenly move from admiration for Jesus to insults and why Jesus cites the two proverbs: "**Physician, cure yourself**" and "no prophet is accepted in his own native place" and also how he managed to escape from so many angry people. In fact, what happened in the synagogue at Nazareth is an introduction to the whole mission of Jesus.

The attempted lynching at Nazareth has its parallel in the scene of the passion of Jesus when he was led out of the city to be executed. And the expression: "Physician, cure yourself" recalls the mockery made to him at the foot of the cross: "He saved others; let him save himself if he is God's Messiah, the Chosen One." (Lk 23:35).

The people might have reacted towards Jesus because he abruptly stopped reading without completing the verse two of Isaiah 61: "He has sent me to proclaim liberty to captives and recovery of sight to the blind, to let the oppressed go free, and to proclaim a year acceptable to the Lord and a day of vengeance for our God to comfort all who mourn..." (Is 61:1-2)

In fact, that was the sentence everyone wanted to hear. The whole Israelites craved for revenge. They wanted the punitive intervention of God against pagans who had oppressed them for many centuries. Instead of vengeance, Jesus announces a "a year acceptable to the Lord", a "jubilee year".

Jesus' two proverbs: "Physician, cure yourself" and "no prophet is accepted in his own native place" increased the tension and friction among the people. They were expecting the repetition of miracles he performed in Capernaum that would mark the beginning of the Messianic era. The two proverbs are denials of their expectations and a distancing from their beliefs.

The last verse: "Jesus passed through the midst of them and went away" is not his miraculous disappearance. It is a message of comfort and optimism that St. Luke wants to give to his community who are facing opposition and hostility. St. Luke confirms that they too will pass through the midst of persecution until they reach their goal.

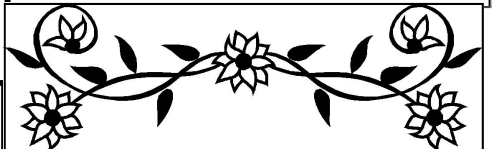
